Working alongside Ned McCarthy, our 2025 Prefect – Head of Boarding, we have introduced a number of new initiatives aimed at strengthening the boys' wellbeing, independence and sense of belonging. A key focus this year has been empowering our boarders to be inquisitive, to lead and to contribute to positive change within the community.

As a Catholic community, we have also renewed our approach to supporting the boys on their spiritual journey. This year we brought Mass and weekday liturgies back into our home, hosting them in the Rostrevor College Chapel. Having our own sacred space has felt meaningful, and the teaching and guidance we have received from Father Matthews has been uniquely tailored to the needs of our boarders and community.

Our boarders continue to make an incredible impact across co-curricular programs — representing their hometowns with pride and carrying the red and black spirit onto fields, courts, and ovals across the state.

Boarders have formed the backbone of Rostrevor's senior sporting teams this year, with many holding leadership positions across Football, Cricket, Soccer and Tennis.

We have seen continued growth in boarding enrolments, with boys joining us from across South Australia, the Northern Territory and beyond adding to the diversity and vibrancy of our House culture.

Our new catering partnership with Chartwells has also been warmly received by students and staff alike, with a focus on fresh, balanced meals and feedback-driven menus. The boys have enjoyed contributing through



regular "food committee" meetings, helping to shape meal offerings and strengthen their voice in the daily life of Duggan House.

This year, Rostrevor College once again celebrated National Boarding Week, with our boarders hosting a fundraising barbecue for charity, conducting Duggan House tours for Year 6 students, and enjoying a dinner with a 'touch of country'. The theme of the week – *sharing our why* – invited boys to reflect on what brings them to Rostrevor and the diverse communities they represent back home.

We also hosted the Duggan House 'Gather Round' Boarding Tour, welcoming prospective boarding families from across Australia to experience life at Rostrevor first-hand. Coinciding with the AFL Gather Round weekend, the event offered a relaxed morning tea where families met staff and current students, gaining a genuine insight into the warmth and spirit of our boarding community.

Another highlight was hosting Loreto College for a breakfast barbecue, where we welcomed fellow boarders to celebrate community, leadership, and the shared spirit of boarding education. Strengthening our connection with Loreto's boarding community has been a rewarding experience, and we look forward to building on this partnership in the years ahead.

Boarding life remains as lively as ever. When our boarders are not studying or representing the College, they throw

themselves into a range of excursions from AFL, A-League, and NBL matches to the Adelaide Fringe, Royal Adelaide Show, golf, The Beach House and tenpin bowling.

As we look ahead, our focus remains on creating a nurturing and dynamic environment that supports every boy to grow into the best version of himself in character, faith and independence.

Generations in Jazz Medalists.









Over the first weekend in May, Rostrevor's Senior Band, Senior Jazz Band, and Small Jazz Ensemble proudly represented the College at Generations in Jazz — the largest school music festival in the Southern Hemisphere. Held in Mount Gambier, this nationally renowned event brought together nearly 5,000 students from every state and territory across Australia to celebrate and compete in jazz and ensemble performances.

Rostrevor students represented the school with excellence across three different divisions and achieved outstanding results. The Senior Band delivered a strong performance and was awarded second place in Division 2.

A special congratulations goes to Alecs Zorzi and Ashton Nguyen, who were recognised for their exceptional individual contributions and selected to perform in the prestigious Division 2 Superband — an ensemble made up of the top musicians from across the division. The pair joined a few other students from across Australia to perform for the 5000 students, staff, parents and adjudicators present.

The Small Jazz Ensemble also earned a well-deserved 2nd place in the open 'Small Jazz' division against dozens of other groups.

The students' dedication, passion, and professionalism were on full display, and they represented Rostrevor College with pride on one of Australia's biggest music stages.

Social Justice Group.

Rostrevor's Social Justice group has continued to grow as a vibrant expression of student leadership, action and compassion. The core group of 35–40 committed members (which at one stage reached 50 students) meet once a week to identify initiatives that not only respond to community needs, but also nurture a culture of inclusion, stewardship and solidarity across the College.

Building Community and Belonging

The year began with a strong focus on practical action and inclusivity. Students organised weekly emu parades to keep the school grounds clean and launched the 10-cent recycling competition, encouraging both sustainability and teamwork.

For Harmony Day, under the theme *We Belong*, students courageously shared their family stories, highlighting the rich cultural heritage that shapes our community. A world map was created for each House, where students placed pins marking their family's origins, offering a powerful visual reminder of the diversity and unity within the College.

The term concluded with a moving reflection during Refugee Week. Our College Counsellor, Mason Somerville ('03), shared his personal experiences of working with refugees on Christmas Island, offering students insight into the challenges faced by displaced people and the importance of compassion and advocacy. Inspired by this work, Mason went on to write songs about justice and solidarity and even formed a group called *Minority Tradition*, whose music has inspired many to reflect on hope, resilience and human dignity.

Deepening Understanding and Taking Action

In the middle of the year, the Social Justice group turned its focus towards issues of solidarity and service. Trent Hill, a First Nations story teller and guide, facilitated a session with the team on the traditional use of local flora and fauna. This was a vital step in preparing students to support our First Nations brothers in developing the Yarning Circle, a space that will be both cultural and communal.









The team also engaged with Edmund Rice Camps, listening to guest speaker Caitlin Gill, who shared stories of families in need of respite and the joy these camps bring to young people. Caitlin's message inspired students to consider volunteering their time to make a difference in the lives of others.

A highlight of the year was the St Vincent De Paul Winter Sleep Out, where 52 students braved the cold to experience, in a small way, the struggles faced by those without shelter. The following morning, students participated in the Hutt Street Walk-a-Mile event in the city, standing in solidarity with people experiencing homelessness.

Extending Leadership and Learning

This year also saw students extend their leadership beyond the College. Select students represented our community in the CESA Student Advisory Body and CESA Student Leadership Workshops, where they contributed their voices to broader discussions on education, justice and youth leadership. These opportunities enabled students to develop confidence, public speaking skills and a deeper understanding of how student voice can shape change.


In addition, students participated in intergenerational programs at local nursing homes, fostering relationships

with residents through meaningful conversations and shared experiences. At Warrina Park, students contributed to a groundbreaking study exploring how Virtual Reality can bridge the gap between young and old, showing how technology can promote empathy and connection across generations.

The team also supported the World Wheelchair Rugby Challenge, celebrating inclusivity in sport and learning more about the resilience, determination, and teamwork demonstrated by athletes living with disability. These experiences broadened the students' perspectives and reinforced the principle that justice is not only about advocacy but also about respect, equality and shared humanity.

Through these initiatives, the Social Justice group has demonstrated that small acts of service, when done with great love, have the power to transform both individuals and communities. Weekly meetings have provided a space for students to dream, plan and act, giving them ownership of projects that embody our College values. From sustainability drives and cultural celebrations to advocacy, leadership opportunities and intergenerational connections, this year has been marked by genuine commitment to living out justice.

Waterholes / Waterways




The waterways connect us back to the natural terrain of Kaurna country and the river that carved out the valley that is at the heart of our school.

Agriculture Award for Rostrevor.



Each year, research company AgXtra runs a 'crop competition' for schools, primarily targeting Year 11 Agriculture students, where students make real industry-based decisions such as selecting a wheat variety, sowing rate and fertiliser regime. AgXtra then sows each team's crops and harvests them later in the year, determining the winner by gross margin.

It was an extremely challenging year for crop production being one of the driest years in the last century, but the students showed creativity in seeking solutions to adapt.

Of the 42 teams from schools and universities across the state, Rostrevor's team comprising of Josh Holt, Alessio Quirino, Parth Singh, and Jay Vanderwerf secured first place overall—an incredible achievement!

This comes after Tom Braunack ('24) and James McFarlane ('24) secured two of the three SACE Merits awarded to Stage 2 Agricultural Systems students from across the state last year.

Rostrevor has cemented itself as a destination for Agriculture students who benefit from the on-site Agriculture Farm and thrive under the expert guidance of Agricultural Science Coordinator, Sam Powell.

The Rite Journey.

This year, Rostrevor College has partnered with The Rite Journey to deliver their program to Year 9 students. The program's objective is to help guide students in their transition from childhood to adulthood, encouraging them to recognise and take responsibility for their behaviours as they prepare to take their place in the world.

The program began at the start of the school year with the Calling and Departure Ceremony where the students' parents and caregivers shared heartfelt letters of gratitude with their boys before enjoying a sunrise breakfast on the Rostrevor House front lawns.

Meeting regularly with a designated teacher and chosen male mentor, students are given the space to engage in important and meaningful conversations. To support these conversations, the College invited guest speaker Daniel Principe to engage with students in Term 2, who encouraged them to think about what it means to lead lives marked by integrity, compassion and empathy. Working extensively in Catholic schools and associations across Australia, he is known for his engaging seminars promoting healthy values among young people – particularly in the areas of respectful relationships, social media, identity and media literacy.

The Year 9 cohort have been given a number of challenges across the year to promote personal growth and resilience, and participated in a range of events including an overnight camp to round out the program.

The headline achievement came in April, when our Open squad claimed the EREA Soccer Tournament title in Brisbane for the very first time in our history. In a gripping final against St Lawrence's College, the boys showed incredible resilience and composure, securing victory after extra time to lift the prestigious trophy.

On the local stage, our Year 7/8 knockout team progressed to the quarter finals before bowing out to a strong Nazareth College outfit. The Year 9/10 and Open knockout squads remain in contention, with their finals campaigns still underway at the time of writing.

The First XI enjoyed another strong season, winning the hotly contested Intercol match against Sacred Heart College in emphatic fashion with five goals to two. They finished fourth in the SAAS Division 1 ladder, falling to CBC in the semi-final, but made history by winning the Interstate Independent Schools Cup for the fourth consecutive year, defeating Newington College once again in the final.

In a breakthrough for our program, the Second XI reached the finals of the SAAS Division 2 Twilight competition for the first time ever. They stunned the competition by defeating premiers Cabra Dominican College in the semi-final, before narrowly losing 1–0 to St Paul's College in the Grand Final – a remarkable effort given they were competing against other schools' First XI squads!

Participation and engagement continue to surge, with 15 senior co-curricular teams fielded this year, each boasting strong numbers. Our six Manchester City classes in 2025 are a testament to the growing appetite for high-level football education at Rostrevor, ensuring the future of the program is brighter than ever.

2025 will be remembered not only for the silverware and milestones achieved, but for the way our players represented Rostrevor with passion, skill, and pride – both at home and on the national stage.

The Rostrevor College Football Program enjoyed another memorable season in 2025. A newly formatted SAAS competition saw us in Division 1, and most of our different teams playing the same school on any given weekend. This format was welcomed by families and created more opportunities for students to support their peers and build camaraderie.

Under the strong leadership of Captain Ned McCarthy, Rostrevor's First XVIII showed commendable development throughout the year. After some strong victories against St Peter's College and Immanuel College, and spirited losses to Prince Alfred College and Sacred Heart College earlier in the season, the team faced St Michael's College in the third place final. This game proved to be the highlight of the year, with Rostrevor running away in the second half and playing their best game for the year. Rostrevor 12.13 (85) defeated St Michael's 7.8 (50), securing third place overall from all schools entered in the SAAS competition across Adelaide.

Rostrevor's Year 9/10 Knockout team entered the State-wide competition with confidence on the back of some good form in the 10A competition to start the year. The 9/10 team got off to a good start in the competition, defeating a strong Henley High School team and Trinity College before they faced tough opposition against PAC in the Semi-Final. A high-quality contest saw Rostrevor prevail, booking a spot in the final against Sacred Heart College at Richmond Oval. Despite some early nerves, the team steadied under the leadership of Captain Daly Olthoff and won the game by 13 points. This marks Rostrevor's first Knockout Football title since 2009 – a historic achievement for our Year 9/10 squad.

Rostrevor's historic Intercol fixture against Sacred Heart was another highlight of the season for our teams. All teams played with spirit and determination in what are always hard-fought contests. One of the best performing teams was the 10A side, who led narrowly at three-quarter time before kicking four unanswered goals in the last quarter to record a memorable victory.

The 10A team also provided further highlights during their SAAS campaign, making it through to the 10A Shield Final. Although they were narrowly defeated by PAC, their performance this year has set a strong foundation for years to come.

Whilst some teams enjoyed plenty of success, playing in Division 1 meant that every week presented tough opposition. Despite losing more games than they won, the development of the Year 9 group is worth highlighting. Their growth over the past 12 months has been clear to all who have watched them, and we look forward to seeing how they continue to progress as they step into Year 10.

Congratulations to Noah Daw (Year 12) and Fergus Myall (Year 12), who were selected for the 2025 South Australian Under 18 State Football team that competed in the U/18 AFL National Championships. Noah and Fergus were joined by fellow Norwood teammate Balyn O'Brien, who graduated from Rostrevor in 2024. Congratulations also to Archie Simpson (Year 11), Charlie Best (Year 11) and Oliver Easton (Year 10) on their selection in the Under 16 State Football team, as well as to Brock Langeluddecke (Year 10) and Tyler Hitch (Year 9) who represented SA in the Under 15 Championships.

The 2024/25 First XI Cricket season was a thrilling journey of grit, development, and triumph for Rostrevor College. Led by Captain Alecs Zorzi and Vice-Captains James Clarke and Will Fanning, the side showed tremendous character throughout both the Term 4 one-day competition and the Term 1 two-day format. From battling the strongest cricketing schools in South Australia to sealing an unforgettable Intercol victory, this season was defined by passion and resilience.

The Term 4 competition began with narrow defeats to Prince Alfred College and Westminster School, but the team rebounded in stunning fashion. Rostrevor bowled Sacred Heart College out for 140 and chased down the total with conviction, finishing 10/137 off just 33.3 overs. That victory ignited momentum that carried through wins against Immanuel College (6/202 def 9/201), and a nail-biter against St Peter's College where Rostrevor lost despite posting a competitive 10/167.

One of the most exciting games of the term came against Pembroke School, where chasing 226, Rostrevor reached 5/228 in 38.3 overs—an outstanding team batting performance!

In the first round of Finals, Rostrevor secured a dramatic win over Westminster, defending 172 with a gutsy bowling display to edge home by one run (9/172 def 8/171)

In the shift to the longer format in Term 1 this year, Rostrevor's bowling depth and batting patience came to the fore. In the opening two-day fixture, they secured a strong win against Pembroke, defending 10/172 by bowling them out for 142.

The following week, against St Peter's, Rostrevor batted first and posted a strong 203. In reply, Saints edged past with 204, finishing nine runs down in a thrilling one-wicket win. The next fixture against Prince Alfred College was a season highlight. Rostrevor bowled first and had PAC in early trouble, dismissing them for just 33. However, PAC bounced back with the ball and eventually declared at 7/194 in their second innings. Rostrevor, after making 137 in their first dig, batted again and finished 3/61, holding on as the

match concluded, Rostrevor took the first innings points and finished the Two-Day Competition as equal leaders.

The season concluded with a historic win in the 102nd Intercol Cricket match against Sacred Heart College. Rostrevor bowled first and ripped through the Sacred Heart batting lineup, dismissing them for just 42 in the first innings. With momentum on their side, Rostrevor responded with 133 to establish a commanding lead, thanks to a composed innings and important partnership between new boarders Tyler Hitch and Jackson Yates, who both showed great resilience under pressure.

In the second innings, SHC regrouped and made 186, setting a tricky final target. Chasing 98 for victory in the final session, the pressure mounted. Lead by hard hitting and fearlessness from opening batsman Jake Polkinghorne, Rostrevor reached 8/98, sealing the win with just 20 minutes left in the day. Year 12 all-rounder Will Fanning struck the winning boundary, etching his name into Intercol folklore. Meanwhile, Jarrah Reidy's extraordinary seven-wicket haul ensured he earned the Intercol Medal for his match-winning bowling performance.

The 2024/25 season will be remembered not just for its results, but for the camaraderie, spirit, and relentless determination shown by the squad. Congratulations to the entire First XI squad and coaching staff on a sensational season that brought pride to the red and black.

Jarrah Reidy

The Year 11 Boarder from Port Lincoln has been making waves as a pace bowler in Rostrevor's First XI Cricket team, having debuted for the side when he arrived as a Year 10 in 2024.

Last year, he was named as one of three Rostrevor students in the South Australian U15 Cricket team which saw him travel to Queensland for the National Championships. His performance during the competition caught the attention of talent scouts who selected him for the U15 All-Australian Cricket team.

Not only a handy player, Jarrah also demonstrates sportsmanship during his games, embodying the Rostrevor Co-Curricular Program's 'good bloke' policy. His on-field attitude earned him the Blue Round medal in 2024, awarded to the player who best demonstrates mateship and College spirit.

Jarrah put on a standout performance at this year's Cricket Intercol, taking an impressive seven wickets against Sacred Heart in Term 1. His consistent performances also earned him the Leading Wicket Taker and Bowling Award for Rostrevor's First XI at the end of the 2024-2025 season.

An amazing feat for the Aussie Frontline Foundation.









From 1 May to 23 May this year, I ran from Melbourne to Adelaide via the Great Ocean Road — a total of 1,042 kilometres, with the final 42km symbolically honouring the 42 Australian soldiers lost in Afghanistan.

I averaged around 45km a day for 23 days straight, no rest.

I ran to support the *Aussie Frontline Foundation* — a charity focused on the mental and physical health of frontline workers, military personnel and veterans. As a combat veteran who served in Afghanistan, this cause is deeply personal.

I've seen firsthand what war does to soldiers — not just during deployment, but especially when they return home. Australia lost 42 soldiers during the war on terror (some of those were close mates from my tours), but since then, we've tragically lost over 1,600 veterans to suicide. I wanted to shine a light on that devastating statistic and remind people that the battle doesn't end when the war does. It was about honouring the fallen and helping the living to keep going.

I raised \$50,000 for the charity, but the awareness we generated was just as powerful — if not more. Conversations were sparked nationwide, and that kind of impact is priceless.

I'd never attempted a run like this before, but I've done deployments to Afghanistan, and I can honestly say both tested me in very different ways.

My incredible support crew was my mum and my 30-week pregnant wife. We lived out of a Winnebago, occasionally stopping in Airbnbs to rest and recover. It was truly a team effort.


By day three, I'd lost most of my toenails — and honestly, that ended up being the least of my worries. The physical toll was intense, but mentally I was fine and stable. I had been through worse in Afghan, but it just reinforced why I was doing it.

I'd like to thank all the military personnel, veterans and first responders who continue to keep our country and communities safe. This run was for them.

Now that I've had time to reflect, I'm more determined than ever. I'm already planning to go further and run longer — to keep raising awareness and funds for those silently battling PTSD. This is just the beginning.

50kms for The Epilepsy Centre.







One of my best mates from Rostrevor has been diagnosed with Epilepsy and has recently had a few seizures, which were extremely difficult to deal with as a close friend, alongside having a strong relationship with his family.

When my friend undertook recent testing on what specific triggers caused these seizures, a consensus couldn't be established which I struggled to comprehend. Having his independence taken away as a result of this disease, including the loss of his driver's license and being told to hold off playing sport, it was tough to see such a close friend suffer.

I thought it would be a good idea to raise awareness for the South Australian Epilepsy Centre as his family had strong ties with the non-for-profit which looks into researching medication and cures for those diagnosed with Epilepsy.

It was a relatively quick decision. I set up my donation page only a month before my run on 1 March 2025 and initially set out to raise \$2,500. Hundreds of people (mostly affiliated with Rostrevor) very generously donated and my total to date has just surpassed \$10,000 which I am so grateful for.

I ran from Aldinga Beach to The Bath Hotel on the Parade, a total of 50km taking just over six hours to complete. Upon arrival, a congregation of my school mates, Old Collegians and family members cheered me home. The reception was overwhelming and hearing the extent to which this event brought everyone's attention to the cause made the hours of pain worthwhile.

I was lucky to have a few school mates, namely Patrick Baldwin ('20), Connor Butcher ('22) and Anton Slivak ('22), join me on different legs of the run to get me over the line, which I'm very grateful for.

I'd like to acknowledge the Matsis family, McGuinness family, Franzon family, McCabe family, Slivak family and Will O'Malley ('07) (O'Malley Outdoor Creations) for their substantial contributions the cause.

Many of us were also able to share our more memorable recollections and stories from our time with him at the College.

He also discussed what had happened to the many other Christian Brothers that dedicated their life to a religious and educational vocation. Brothers remembered were Br Gibbons, Br John Moylan, Br Morphett, Br Roberts and Br Stanley to name a few who were also there at the same time.

On the morning of 25 April, the Rostrevor College Prefect group gathered at the Gums Reserve at Tranmere to observe and lay a wreath at the ANZAC Day dawn service.

The group were invited to attend the service by the 2025 key speaker, Michelle Matthews, who spoke of her father's time serving in the Vietnam War. Her father, Old Collegian Bruno Adamczyk ('64), was only 22 years old when he was killed in combat days before he was due to return home.

Bruno's grandson Dylan Matthews is also an Old Collegian, graduating in 2020.

There is a plaque to commemorate Bruno in the garden outside the Rostrevor College Chapel, where generations of Rostrevor students have and will continue to stop and reflect on Bruno's story.



The 2024/25 season is done and dusted and whilst it was a year of mixed fortunes, we seem to be brewing the right formula for a bright future.

It was an unusual season for our A Grade, being in a position to win almost every game but unable to convert enough wins to taste finals action. We undoubtedly have the talent to beat any team at this level but the challenge, as is so often the case in cricket, is a mental one. Our bowling and fielding are pretty much where we need them to be, it is with the bat that we need to do better - recognise key moments, stay patient, value our wickets and work in partnerships.

Having said this, there have been a number of memorable highlights for the A Grade this season. The most dominant performance was the clash with Pooraka in which we made runs for fun to score 9/447 before rolling the opposition for 160. This is the highest innings total in the club's history, driven by Club captain Mitch Simpson ('12) who racked up a lazy 220 to join the very select double-ton club for the ROCCCs.

Another game that stands out was the come from behind win against Ingle Farm. We only managed to scrounge out 143 with the bat and a solid start from Ingle Farm at 1/48 in response had us on the back foot. The boys kept at it, however, until a couple of key wickets started a massive collapse in which the last seven wickets fell for just eight runs to close the innings out for 67. Riley Slack ('17) with 3/16, Joel Luppino ('14) with 2/3 and Josh Mothersole ('23) with 2/7 teamed up exceptionally well to nail the memorable win.

Over the course of the season, Mitch Simpson and Russell Thomas ('94) led the way with the bat, whilst really even contributions with the ball came from Gabe Burden ('14), Dylan Fitzsimons ('17), Joel Luppino and Will McDonald ('21).

Our B Grade finished on top of the ladder in the minor round last year which earned them a promotion to division one of the limited over competition. They took the higher standard of cricket in their stride in the early part of this season, reeling off five wins in the first seven rounds and nestling in at the pointy end of the table.

Since then, however, a glut of player movements in and out of the side disrupted the momentum and wins became scarce. There were some good victories to savour, but in the end these were too sporadic and we weren't able to make it to the finals.

Andy O'Connor ('07) led the troops admirably again as captain. Our leading run scorers were Jay Hoffman and Jarran Crabb ('07), whilst Pat Taylor and Jesse Hoffman did best with the ball.

One of the biggest stories of this season was the journey that our C Grade took, from a team that has typically struggled to coming ever so close to going all the way.

It was a slow burn to start with, chalking up just two wins from the first eight rounds. Momentum started to build in the middle part of the season, before coming home with a wet sail to be undefeated in the last five rounds. The sluggish start to the season meant that we just scraped into the finals, but by this stage the boys had found their groove and were taking down any team in their path.

The boys got off to a great start in the semi-final, taking on the minor round premiers Hectorville and rolling them for 95 runs. Unfortunately, things did not go to plan with the bat, however, and we fell painfully short of this total in the end. The game was somewhat marred with controversy where, on a sub-standard pitch, the opposition took the irregular (and some might say illegitimate) step of rolling the pitch after losing the toss and being sent in to bat, to give them the best of the conditions.

Nevertheless, all sour grapes aside, it was still a great season for our C Grade, its most successful in a several years. What began as an unlikely mix of youngsters coupled with a few wily old guys transformed into a committed and invested team through a combination of hard work on the track and the infectious enthusiasm that each personality brought to the table.

We see this group as a template for the future of our club. Of course, to improve we need to practice and work hard on our skills. But it's also important to know our

roles in the side, to do what's best for the team and bring everyone else along for the ride. These seem to be some of the key ingredients to becoming a real team and doing what we can to contribute to that group so that the whole really does become greater than the sum of its parts. Taking this philosophy across all our grades will put us in good stead for years to come.

Gus Honner ('17) as captain was instrumental to the success of the team. Julian MacIntosh, Glenn Bertram, Jared Naughton and Gus Honner led the way with the bat this season. Jared Naughton, as well as newcomers to the club Harry Way and Marshall Nitschke ('23) led the way with the ball. Jared had a sensational year, remarkably taking not one but two hat-tricks amongst his many wickets.

Our coaching team, that includes Stephen Harby ('77), Michael Harby ('77) and Richard Holmes has done a mighty job working with the boys, continually encouraging and nurturing them to develop into better players.

A big thanks to Matt ('90) and Luke Kelly ('00) and The Republic Hotel, as our major sponsor again, and of course the College for their ongoing support and use of the grounds.

Would we have wanted more wins in the 2024/25 season? Of course, the answer is yes. However, there were so many green shoots and good signs coming out of the year that give us a strong foundation upon which we can build. Now, spring is in the air and a new season is nearly upon us.... we have a lot to look forward to.

ROCSC Celebrates 45 Years

In 2025, Rostrevor Old Collegians Soccer Club proudly celebrates its 45th anniversary. From humble beginnings in 1980, the club has grown into a thriving, successful institution within the Collegiate Soccer League (CSL).

Season Highlights

To kick off our 45th season in style, the Division 1A squad secured a remarkable CSL Super Cup three-peat, defeating the 2024 CSL League Champions, Port Adelaide, 3–0 in the final. Goals came from Steve Savino ('14), Jakob Centofanti ('23), and Thomas D'Antonio ('18). Congratulations to coach Thomas Innamorati ('06) and the entire A Squad for their outstanding achievement.

Despite a slow start, winning only one of their first four games, our Division 1A team went on a dominant run to secure a place in the top two. Although they finished the season strongly, the team narrowly missed out on the league title by a single point, finishing second. Jakob Centofanti was a key contributor, scoring 16 goals in 16 appearances, while Adam De leso ('19) continued to prove why he's one of the league's best, netting 11 goals in 20 games.

Following a heartbreaking 2024 season, the team led by Ben Fragnito ('14), has bounced back strongly in 2025. Despite early-season injuries and multiple players being unavailable due to holidays, they demonstrated their experience and quality, recording 15 wins, two draws, and just one loss across 18 games, finishing the season in second. Julian Spadavecchia ('16) was deservedly named Division 1B League Player of the Year at the CSL Presentation Night.

Our only league triumph of the year came in Division 4, as the team cruised to the title. After falling short by four points in 2024, they rebounded with a near-perfect season, winning 17 and drawing one of their 18 games, scoring 102 goals and conceding only 9. Adam Villano ('19) was in lethal form once again, scoring 26 goals across both the Division 1B and Division 4 competitions. Congratulations to our Invincible League Winners on securing their fourth championship in five years.

Our Division 5 squad also impressed in 2025, finishing the season in second place. Although last year's league champions were unable to reclaim their title, the team displayed brilliance and resilience throughout, ending the season with six consecutive wins, including a memorable 4–1 victory over Sturt Lions.

The club has again fielded four men's teams and one women's side (LOSA) playing in the Adelaide Footy League, recognised as the strongest league in the State.

Our Coaching lineup has seen a couple of changes with the club appointing new B Grade coach Jamie Thomas and C Grade Coach Peter Pedersen ('94). Both have close ties to the ROCs with Jamie's son a current player and Peter having played for the ROCs and being a past President.

The A Grade is again led by Damien Boots ('81) with his assistant Adam West ('89) with the ROCs Academy side (also known as the D Grade) being mentored and coached by the evergreen Steve Edwards.

The A Grade Captain for 2025 is Stefan Lanzoni ('19). Stef takes over from long serving player and club great Daniel McCallum ('10). Stef has set some high standards for others to follow and has the respect of all at the club.

The boys' season started way back in late November 2024 with very good numbers for the pre-Christmas three-week block with new and old players blowing out some cobwebs and starting to get some conditioning into their legs. As always, we finished off the last session with a BBQ and some refreshments before heading off for a five-week break.

In late January we welcomed back to the club ex-Norwood mid-fielder Xavier Tranfa ('20), as well as Darci Best ('23), Beau Baldwin ('22), Tom McCormack ('17) and Jett Boxer ('20) who have all been at SANFL clubs in recent years. The influx from the College's graduating class is always great to see and this year was no different with some 20 from last year's Year 12s pulling on the ROCs jumper for the first time. Our conditioning coach John Turner was once again at the forefront of getting the boys into shape for the long season.

February sees the training extended to three sessions a week with Saturday mornings a non-compulsory yet encouraged session at various venues around the city. During this period the club engaged Rostrevor Old Collegian and former Port Adelaide legend David Arnfield ('77) who in his professional role as Partner/Facilitator with Leading Teams Australia helped to give the players a clear sense of purpose with the ultimate goal of success.

As we prepared for the start of our Division 1 campaign the sight of 100 players training under the setting autumn sun at Campbelltown Oval was worth the wait, with the new season upon us and the players, coaches, trainers, rehab staff and volunteers ready to go the excitement was palpable. We had a great start to the season with the A and C Grades defeating the old enemy in Payneham.

Round 2 saw us playing at home against last year's Division 1 grand finalist, Glenunga FC. We did ourselves proud, but unfortunately after leading all day and having played some terrific football, we were nailed on the final siren by one point – a tough loss at home for the A Grade. Not all was lost as the B and C Grades both had excellent wins with then Academy team going down narrowly again.

Over the coming weeks through Rounds 3, 4 and 5 the A Grade had wonderful wins over PAOC by one point, Broadview by a few goals on a windy and nasty day and beating Salisbury North by three points after coming back from 39 points down early in the third quarter. Both the PAC and Salisbury North wins showed the character of the players as in both games we were headed by large margins, but the players stuck to what they know and the structures they've been taught and the belief in each other.

A Grade suffered some close loses in R6 to 9 but also had a strong performance against SHOC to win by 27 points. The mighty D Grade went on a winning streak picking up three out of four wins and moving towards to the right end of the ladder.

The second half of the year saw all grades started with a great flourish with the A Grade having wins against Payneham, Glenunga, PAOC and Broadview, the B Grade had started to turn things around with a couple of excellent wins and the C Grade went on a winning streak picking up three wins from these four rounds. Meanwhile the Academy

side grabbed a couple of well-earned wins and stayed in touch of the top four.

Round 14 saw the troops head out to Salisbury North which is comfortably the toughest game on the road in a season. The B and C Grades had wonderful wins and helped to push them further up the ladder. Old Collegians Remembered.



Francis Creagh O'Connor ('54)

Creagh was born on 24 February 1937 and first attended the College from Grade 3 in 1946 as a day scholar, then living at Ferguson Square Toorak Gardens, and experienced his final year as a boarder in 1954. By his own admission he was not a scholar, but more importantly, he excelled at cricket and was a member of the First XI, Second XVIII and was a Prefect in his final year.

Lifelong friends were established in those years including Reg Moriarty ('52), Bruce Johnson ('53), Gavin ('53) and Brendan Kain ('52), Bob Rundle ('53) and his country cousins Michael ('54) and Des Shanahan ('55).

His connection with the College did not cease when he left in 1954. He continued to be involved in many roles including as a parent with his wife Carmel nee Gibson (married in 1960, daughter of Leo Gibson ('23)) of Creagh Jr ('77), Andrew ('80) and Tim and grandfather of Alberto ('07), Tom ('07), George ('11), William ('15) and Charlie ('12), who all survived him, together with his daughters Edwina Lumbers and Rachel Dolling. He was a generous benefactor to the College, an inaugural Foundation Board Member and its first Chair.

The strong O'Connor family connection to the College is exemplified by the presence of the statue of St Joseph on the lawns in front of Rostrevor House donated by Creagh's father Frank in honour of Thomas Joseph O'Connor (Creagh's grandfather).

He played football and cricket after graduation and was involved in the 1980s formation of an additional Old Collegians cricket team which he proudly captained, known as the Invitation XI which included many "past cricketers" resuming as "active" players who enjoyed the success of five premierships notwithstanding the aging process. Much joy was had during and after the games with Creagh providing carefully prepared sandwiches and beverages at tea, and in particular, long post mortems at the team's headquarters at Saturnos Norwood Hotel (and with no exhausting weekly net practice sessions!).

Creagh made a new group of lasting friends in this period including but not limited to Roger Wasley ('64), Jack Bailey ('65), David Smith ('63), Leon McEvoy ('63), Chris Moriarty ('81), Mick McManus, John Kain ('84), Mark Shadiac ('73), Tim Ryan ('71) and David Pozza ('68) to name a few.

Creagh's cricket interests extended beyond Rostrevor. He was on the


South Australian Cricket Association Board and was director from 1991-2010 and took on the onerous but rewarding role as a director of Cricket Australia from 1999 until 2008, including the leadership role as chairman from 2005-2008, giving him access to many overseas locations and cricket legends. In business he was a "Captain of Industry".

His grandfather established T.O'Connors and Sons in 1884 which subsequently became a public company of which he and his brother Henry ('57) were integral members, directors and Creagh being managing director for 25 years. The business name O'Connors is still a powerhouse in Australian mechanical engineering and construction and is now controlled by his son Andrew, and enthusiastically sponsored by Creagh in its formation, and until his last years.

He was the chairman of a Public Listed Company American Rare Earths until reaching 86 years (possibly the oldest director of a Public Company in Australia apart from Rupert Murdoch!) and up to his death was involved as honorary chair and one of the saviours of the clipper ship City of Adelaide, the world's oldest surviving clipper ship built in 1864 and used for many voyages between Adelaide and Britain.

A true gentleman was Francis Creagh. He passed away on 25 March 2025. His funeral Mass was held at St Laurence's North Adelaide with an overflowing congregation of family and friends paying their last respects to his long and successful life.

Michael Ignatius Sheehan ('57)

Michael was born in Tumby Bay on 27 January 1940 to Gerald Sheehan and Kathleen "Mollie" (nee Secker). He was the eldest of seven children (five brothers and one sister) who all grew up on the family farm near Cummins.

Michael attended Rostrevor as a border for his secondary education, from 1955-1957. During his time as a border, he won the WJ Bland trophy in 1955 for U16 swimming. Michael had many memories of his time at Rostrevor and often recalled other students, the changes to the country and buildings, swimming in the local dam and catching the "MV Minnipa" across the Spencer Gulf.

He often mentioned Brother Bourke and Brother Mogg. Brother Bourke made a profound and lasting impact on the family, helping to ensure that all six brothers were able to receive a Rostrevor education after the death of their father put significant financial strains on the family. Brother Bourke had known their

father as a friend and old classmate, having both attended Rostrevor together in the 1920s.

Michael's father Gerald Sheehan ('24) attended Rostrevor along with his five younger brothers: Denis ('59), Richard ('62), Peter ('64), Mark ('69) and David ('75). His sister Margret attended Loreto College in 1962 to 1967.

Michael's son Gerard was unable to attend Rostrevor due to the Boarding House closure, but his grandsons Randal ('17) and Alistair ('19) attended as boarders. His daughter Jane attended Loreto College in the 1990s.

After graduation, Michael headed north to his father's recently purchased pastoral lease, Moolawatana at the very end of the Gammon Ranges. He worked under the management of Mr Rex Scott to learn the ropes and picked up many skills from the local First Nations peoples and other pastoralists.

At the age of 22, Michael took over management, and for the next 60 years applied his knowledge to improve and diversify the property. He was progressive with emerging technology, being one of the first to invest in solar pumping for bore water and using a composite electric fence for sections of the Dog Fence. In 1971 he married Audrey Heinrich at Port Victoria by Father Kevin Matthews ('57). Michael and Kevin were Rostrevor boarders at the same time. Michael and Audrey overcame many natural challenges: drought so severe the property was pretty much destocked, floods causing loss of stock in bogs, no mail or food stores delivered for six

weeks, rabbits which decimated the country and dingoes/wild dogs in massive numbers, at times resulting in a 2% lambing average and eventually forcing the change from sheep to cattle (at the peak the property held 26,000 sheep).

During his time at Moolawatana he saw many changes and the introduction of motorbikes, diesel 4WDs, aircraft, solar power bores and 24hr 240V solar power, bitumen roads, landline, mobile and satellite telephones, satellite TV, internet, digital cameras, electronic stock tag system, telemetry water systems and air conditioning just to name a few.

Michael was very community minded and supported anyone who wanted to have a go (larrikins and those with a bit of mischief had his full encouragement). As a mentor he was up for the challenge and those he guided are still in touch. He kept an active role in the property, even after retirement and was always keen to give a hand when needed.

Michael was an extremely hard working, modest, straight shooting, honourable family man with a wonderful sense of humour. He will be missed greatly and never forgotten.

Norm's joie de vivre made for a busy recreational life. A keen golfer, he also enjoyed tennis, water and snow skiing, heli-skiing, scuba diving, travelling and a love and appreciation of literature and the arts. He was well known to delight in good food and a nice red wine.

Norm will be sorely missed by his beloved wife Judy, and his large and ever-growing family of children, grandchildren and greatgrandchildren. He will most fondly be remembered for his intellect, sharp wit and good humour.

Paul Shadiac ('70)

Paul was born on the 6th of July 1952, to Bert and Kath Shadiac at LeFevre Hospital. For the first eight years of Paul's life, he lived at Alberton, right in the heart of Port Adelaide. The Shadiac family were mad Port Adelaide supporters, except for Paul's dad who was a Westies fan, but his influence wasn't enough to budge the boys from being Port supporters.

In 1960, the Shadiacs moved to Rostrevor into a small double-brick house with a big backyard and a creek at the end of the block. Paul and Mark ('73), and later John ('76) spent countless hours kicking the footy, commentating imaginary grand final goals, and dreaming big.

Paul had a gift for turning anything into a game. Whether it was who could eat the fastest, a race to the corner, or whether the dish dryer could beat the dish washer—everything became a competition. Paul loved any sport—footy, cricket, squash, volleyball, basketball and

touch football. He loved the beach, swimming, fishing, and waterskiing up the river. We thrived on adventure, were resourceful, and always creative.

Paul was one of the nicest guys you'd ever meet—but on the field, he played hard. You'd always want him on your team—not just because he could nullify his opponent, but because he had your back.

Paul was a good footballer and played in the First XVIII in the years he attended Rostrevor College. He went on to play for CBOC after school, then A1 Amateur League for Payneham, then Adelaide Teachers College. Although a hard and competitive player, his greatest accolades were attributed to his coaching ability.

After retiring from playing, Paul coached the Rostrevor Old Collegians Football Club. In just three years, he took ROCS from A3 to A1. The stuff of folklore is the 1986 premiership win. ROCS' nemesis that year was Scotch OC. We'd lost to them by eight goals twice during the season—and again by 15 goals in the second semi-final. Two weeks later, in the grand final, we beat them by four goals. The win has since been referred to as "Scotch on the ROCS". Paul was a brilliant tactician, but more than that, he was a mentor. He treated everyone with respect and brought the best out of people.

During our primary and secondary years in Rostrevor, we met a group of friends that are known today as the "Moules Road Gang." Boy, we had some fun growing up alongside the Sheedys, Coligans, Buschs,

Konopkas, McBrides, Szarbos and Coghlans – all Rostrevor boys. We learned about life together—olive picking during May school holidays, camping in the hills at the back of Szarbos', bike riding, footy and cricket in the park, music, parties, and even forming a band.

Of all the guys in the groups, it would be fair to say that Paul was probably the best looking bloke. This was later validated when he was awarded male model of the year. He was featured on Today Tonight in a segment that showed a Male Model is not just a person of good looks but a person of substance. The clip showed Paul when he was Captain, Coaching Tranmere YCW football. He also appeared as a guest on Blind Date, where one of three successful women was selected by Paul to go on a date.

When we would go out to the Feathers or Leon's on a Thursday night or the Redlegs Club on a Saturday night, the girls would swoon after Paul. The rest of us would be left in his wake. Underneath all that, Paul would shy away and be embarrassed should he be lauded with any praise.

Paul lived life to the full but he was also well aware what he wanted in a partner for life. I remember him hanging out regularly at Ayres House because he said he had his eyes on the Restaurant owner's daughter, Jane. I knew very early in the piece, he was very keen. Dare I say it, his marriage to Jane was truly a match made in heaven. (Jane's maiden name is Heaven).

They travelled the world and, built a successful jewellery business which

sells all over Australia and New Zealand. Paul was really pleased that Nic and Sam are taking the reins that will see Paul Shadiac Agencies continue for at least another generation.

Paul created a family environment rich in love, adventure, and warmth—just like the one we grew up in. Nicholas, Matthew and Samuel enjoy the spoils of Paul and Jane's vision for the family. Even though Paul has gone, I see him living through the boys.

Paul was more of a "say what you mean and mean what you say", kind of guy. He was charismatic and he brightened every room. He was always at the top of the party invite list. He saw the good in people. He was fiercely loyal to family and friends—and he'd help anyone in need.

Patrick Darcy Walden OAM

Born on Pimpara Lake Station, a 44,000-hectare sheep and cattle station near Broken Hill, Pat made his way to Adelaide as a boarder at Rostrevor College. It was there that he competed in South Australia's first-ever men's gymnastics competition on 5 November, 1952, aged 14.

From that moment on, he made it his life's work to share the joy of gymnastics — and everything it can teach: resilience, self-discipline, character, and the value of persistence. Pat believed in the kind of growth that came not from trophies, but from showing up, sticking with it, and learning who you are along the way.

He was a state team coach for nearly two decades. He coached at the national level, held leadership roles on boards and committees, and was twice named Coach of the Year. He was awarded a Life Membership with Gymnastics SA in 1994, the Australian Sports Medal in 2000, the Centenary Medal in 2003, and in 2004 received the Order of Australia Medal for his service to the community and the sport he loved.

But those honours don't tell the whole story. What made Pat truly special was how deeply he cared for people — not just as athletes, but as humans. He stayed connected well beyond the gym and helped shape so many lives simply by turning up, believing in them, and leading with generosity.

His legacy lives on most strongly at Tea Tree Gully Gymsports and their alumni, a club he helped shape and poured so much of himself into. He was larger than life, a fierce champion for regional clubs, and a friend to all.



Stephen Gerard Ahern ('78)

Stephen was born on 2 May, 1961. He was the fifth child of Margaret and Barry Ahern ('41). He sadly passed away on April 17, 2025, after a short battle with cancer.

Barry attended Rostrevor as did his five sons.

He worked long hours, but a combination of severe weather and the onset of the pandemic would prove too much of a mountain to climb.

Stephen married Louise Segafredo from Shepparton and had two children, Luke and Molly. He loved his many siblings, nieces and nephews and family get togethers were always a priority. Stephen was especially proud of his Sunday roasts. Stephen is the third member of the Ahern family to pass in eleven months, following Michael ('70) on 17 May 2024 and Phillip ('81) on 8 June 2024. May they all rest in peace.
